WELCOME TO JOURNEYING ACROSS THE HIMALAYAS

DEC 4-10 2025 TRAVANCORE PALCE NEW DELHI Journeying Across The Himalayas is a first-of-its-kind multidisciplinary festival that celebrates stories of and from the Himalayas.

Bringing together travellers and communities through installations, exhibitions, and experiences, the festival spans visual arts, music, dance, theatre, performances, culinary journeys, conversations and more. Offering immersive ways to engage with the Himalayas, it opens a gateway into the many voices, experiences, and cultures that shape the region.

This year's theme, "Ours to Tell", looks at the Himalayas as a living archive of stories, identities, traditions—reclaimed, reinterpreted, retold by those to whom they belong.



A dynamic space dedicated to Helmets For India (HFI)-Royal Enfield's not-for-profit artists' collective-where helmet safety meets creative expression. Here, HFI projects curated by **Start Foundation of Art** and Culture, as well as an installation by **Dhruvi** Acharya come together with an always-on claypainting workshop, inviting visitors to reimagine the helmet as both a symbol of protection and a canvas for personal storytelling.

03 RITEK PAVILION

Inspired by the building typology of the Adi community in Arunachal Pradesh and their tradition of collective life, the pavilion by **Vishal K. Dar**, reimagines the *Ritek* as a space for gathering, reflection, and exchange over films and conversations.

04 HUB OF MANY HEART(H)S

A constellation of decentralised pavilions curated by **Prachi Joshi**— multiple heart(h)s of warmth, dialogue and community— each rooted in impact areas like, conservation, and circularity and responsible tourism, centring critical conversations and crosspollination.

05 MAIN STAGE

Through the day, the main stage hosts folk dances, theatre performances, culinary experiences, and hands-on workshops—set against a stage design inspired by Himachal's *Kath Kuni* architectural tradition. As evening arrives, it transforms into the festival's main stage, coming alive with music concerts.

06 CONVERSATIONS STAGE

A space for conversations, talks, panel discussions and spotlight sessions, spanning community storytelling, heritage, ecology, circularity and much more—framed by a striking visual backdrop of original artwork by Ladakh's celebrated contemporary artist **Jigmet Angmo**.

07 HIMALAYAN BAZAAR

The Himalayan Bazaar is the festival's vibrant marketplace—curated by Puneeta Chadha Khanna—bringing together makers and artisans from across the mountains.

08 CHOUKA

A space that brings together the flavours of the Himalayas, Chouka (meaning "kitchen" in the Mizo language) is the festival's food and beverages courtyard, celebrating the warmth and diversity of Himalayan cooking through recipes and ingredients drawn from home kitchens across the region.

09 THE PAGODA TREE

A tranquil gathering space under the Japanese pagoda tree, inviting visitors to relax, linger, and try their hand at clay pottery.





Exhibiting Artists: Ashna Malik, How Are You Feeling Studio, Ishaan Bharat (Osheen), Jigmet Angmo, Kapil Jangid, Khatra, Martand Khosla, Mo Naga, Nabi, Shweta Sharma, Srijan Jha and Vibha Galhotra

Twelve artists from across India come together to explore the helmet as a vessel of meaning in which the everyday object becomes a collectible. Artists employ the languages of craft, design and contemporary art to transform the helmet into an aesthetic statement. Each Art Helmet carries traces of its maker's imagination, yet together they map a shared terrain: where safety is intertwined with identity.

CROWN By Dhruvi Acharya

Crafted from every part of a dismantled Royal Enfield motorcycle, this striking sculpture-memorial reflects a world abruptly transformed, urging collective care and responsibility for the fragile worlds we inhabit.

ECHOES OF THE EAST Curated by Julie Kagti

An interactive exhibition tracing endangered languages, draping traditions, and harvest festivals from Northeast India, presented through soundscapes, textile displays and seasonal rituals.

HELMET ODSSEY Curated by Start Foundation for Art and Culture

Helmets for India extends its vision through a travelling exhibition housed within a custom-designed container, a mobile space that reflects the movement and materiality of the roads it travels. The exhibition looks at how design and engineering can coexist with empathy and expression.

HUB OF MANY HEART(H)S Curated by Prachi Joshi

Treating space itself as a storyteller, the exhibition is a collection of decentralised pavilions, each interacting with pertinent dialogues like culture, conservation, responsible tourism and circularity.

MATERIALS LAB FEATURE By Design Mumbai

An interactive exhibit showcasing the latest innovations in sustainable and advanced materials. Explore how science and creativity converge to shape the future of design, innovation and responsible material use.

MATERIALS OF EVERYDAY LIVING By Material Library of India

An installation exploring circularity through Himalayan materials drawing on indigenous knowledge along with industrial design to reveal the gaps created by human intervention. while reimagining tradition as a foundation for contemporary production and future-making.

RI GYANCHA

Perched atop the Travancore Palace roof, Ri Gvancha rises like a silent guardian of the highlands-a snow leopard installation honouring the Himalayan species Ladakh calls its "jewel of the mountain."

RITEK PAVILION By Vishal K. Dar

In the building typology of the Adi community in Arunachal Pradesh, the Ritek serves as a vital community space—a place where life unfolds through gatherings of all kinds, from settling family feuds to celebrating weddings, festivals and moments of remembrance. Drawing from indigenous building techniques and materials it is an installation inspired by this tradition of collective life.

SACRED NATURE By Aranyani

A living installation inspired by sacred groves, staging a dialogue between invasive and native species; an invitation to consider balance, belonging, and our collective journey back to reverence.

SAND MANDALA Created live by monks from Namaval Monastery. Dharamshala

Witness the creation of a Sand Mandala-a representation of 'Compassion' and an ancient, sacred tradition with profound spiritual significance, being presented outside the monastery for the first time, with the blessings of His Holiness The Dalai Lama.

SHERPA 450 - CUSTOM STREET TRACKER By Naveen Nandal and Nitin Sharma for TNT Motorcycles

An art custom that channels the spirit of the Snow Leopard, a solitary keystone species. With a form as seamless as fresh snow and rosettes like the rocky outcrops of the Himalayas, this machine performs with powerful, balanced agility. It stalks, flows, and dominates its environment-a vivid reflection of the ecosystem it represents.

Visualising a living canopy that supports an entire forest community, The Living Tree brings to mind a habitat alive with wings, whiskers and the soft hum of returning life. Created as an emblem of protection and belonging, it reflects the ecological relationships and landscapes that the imagery calls upon us to safeguard and restore.

This collection celebrates their origins, histories and traditions-unmasking anonymity to let each maker be seen, recognised. and remembered as a custodian of legacy and lived experience.


THE SAKHTA STORY By Burhan Ud Din Khateeb supported by the Good Earth Heritage Foundation

THE FIFTH GESTURE Royal Enfield x MARGN Winner of the Vogue India x Royal Enfield Design Prize -Season 1

Designed by Saurabh Maurya of MARGN for the Self-Help Group Jomche in Darcha. The Fifth Gesture is a collaborative collection exploring the many forms of prayer and faith-gestures that belong to the human condition and bind us together. Using the sleeve motif as a symbol of protection, each piece embodies the union of craft, functionality and meaning, brought to life through intricate handknits and crochet work by an allwomen team of artisans.

GO NORTH Royal Enfield x EKÀ for Looms of Ladakh

Designed by Rina Singh's label EKA and handcrafted by a brand of 400+ women herder-artisans-Looms of Ladakh, the Himalayan Knot sheep wool collection integrates Ladakh's traditional practices with heritage-inspired colours and modern silhouettes. Made using merino and indigenous sheep wool. the pieces feature handembroidered constellation motifs reminiscent of mountain skyscapes that tell the story of the Himalayas.

HIGHER PLAINS Royal Enfield x SUKETDHIR for Looms of Ladakh

Designed by SUKETDHIR for Looms of Ladakh, this collection draws inspiration from the flora, fauna, and architectural singularities that dot the highlands of Ladakh. Two distinct textile traditions harmonise as the collection blends pashmina with jamdani techniques. A modern interpretation of traditional craftsmanshiprendered in earthy hues like Indian madder, marigold, and browns-each silhouette carries with it the warmth of the winter sun.

LETTERS TO HOME Royal Enfield x Countrymade for The Woolknitters

From designer Sushant Abrol's label, Countrymade, in collaboration with The Woolknitters, comes Letters to Home, a local merino sheep wool collection. rooted in mountainscape and memory. Knitted into the fabric are pixelated mosaics of the landscape's ubiquitous motifs-apple orchards, sheep, dawn-drenched hillsides, and a Royal Enfield motorcycle. Each piece in the collection portrays a deliberate distortion, as if looking at home through the fog of memories.

HOMECOMING Royal Enfield x Sonam Dubal for The Action Northeast Trust

Designed by Sonam Dubal in partnership with The Action Northeast Trust, each Eri silk piece in this collection reflects ease, and comfort and insulation of resilient silk through thoughtful construction. Ideal for travel, the collection blends the breathability of traditional craftsmanship with the versatility of empathetic design for the mindful explorer.

COUNTRY ROAD Royal Enfield x Countrymade for The Action Northeast Trust

A quintessential terraininspired collection by designer Sushant Abrol's label, Countrymade, and the Action Northeast Trust. this menswear edit draws on the intricacy of traditional Bodo weaving to reinterpret the elements of a classic country ride-trees, clouds, hills, winding roads, and Royal Enfield, into authentic Bodo motifs. Each piece captures the spirit of exploration that defines the open road.
